Pick up **TIKE stickers at the
Kandiyohi County Health &
Human Services –
Public Health office front desk.**

TIKE is a child safety sticker that provides identifying information to emergency personnel should a car accident render the adults in the vehicle unresponsive.

Once filled out by a family member, the bright **Neon Colored** sticker provides contact information to first responders at the scene of a car crash. Many County EMS staff are aware of the stickers and will look for them.



TIKE stickers should be placed on a flat surface on the side of the car seat towards the door. This placement will alert any emergency responders as soon as they open the door. This placement will also limit visibility by people walking by that you DON'T want to see your personal information. Please remember, you are adding personal info to the sticker that you may not want others to see. If you use the same car seat for more than 1 child, a name and phone number of a relative who knows the child/children might be enough.

Why **TIKE**??

In 1995 a six-month old boy was involved in a head-on crash while riding with a relative. The driver was rendered unconscious and the child suffered a life-threatening head injury. Emergency responders were only able to trace his parents through an address book found in the wreckage. VALUABLE time was lost. The child was airlifted to a nearby hospital for emergency surgery and subsequently recovered.

The Ohio Insurance Institute developed the first stickers in 2003 and have distributed them across Ohio, then across the country and now around the world. Stickers are available in English and

English/Spanish for families, childcare providers, and other groups with children who share the common interest of child safety.

Kandiyohi County Health and Human Services - Public Health Emergency Preparedness became aware of this initiative and felt it would benefit children in our community, county, and beyond.

Individuals may pick up stickers at the Public Health front desk in the Kandiyohi County Health and Human Services Building. Be sure to apply new stickers as information changes.

Incidental note: these stickers are being promoted by Kandiyohi County Health and Human Services - Public Health. Other counties may not be promoting this specific TIKE sticker program.
